We often hear, "home is where the heart is," and we believe the Lansdowne neighborhood is a significant part of the heart of East St. Louis. Lansdowne's rich and storied history is a point of pride for both current and former residents. Today, the hope of the neighborhood radiates through the organizations and individuals who call Lansdowne home. We greatly desire to see the Lansdowne neighborhood and its residents thrive well into the future. Lansdowne UP endeavors to partner with those who love this area and those who may just be getting acquainted with Lansdowne. Together, we hope to build avenues that help shine a bright light on the beauty of the community. Over the last eight years, Lansdowne UP has labored alongside incredible champions of the neighborhood. From abandoned property cleanup to employment opportunities, we have aimed to support the revival and revitalization of Lansdowne.

Our Mission

To transform Lansdowne, East St. Louis, into a thriving neighborhood - one person, one property at a time.

Our Vision

To spark a revival of people loving God, each other, and their neighborhood!

Once a vibrant city, East St Louis has suffered decline due to many factors - loss of industry, population, crime, economic

impoverishment...

We began as East St. Louis Wrestling Club in 2008, bringing kids wrestling to East St. Louis at the Jackie Joyner-Kersee Center. Located in the Lansdowne neighborhood of East St. Louis, the Jackie Joyner-Kersee Center offers kids and families hope. The JJK Center provides a safe haven, resources, and opportunities to rise above.

Beyond the JJK Center was a neighborhood marked with decline. Each block of the neighborhood was riddled with overgrown properties, derelict houses, illegal trash dumps and unsafe streets. The need for hope clearly continued beyond the campus of the JJK Center.

In 2013, East St. Louis Wrestling Club began the Lawns for Learning program. This program was designed to strengthen relationships between kids and coaches, provide workforce development and begin to clean up the neighborhood. Coaches and kids worked together to clear and mow lots. By 2021, our work had grown so vast that Lansdowne UP was established as a not-for-profit separate from East St. Louis Wrestling Club. We now employ 24 people full-time continuing our mission to transform Lansdowne into a thriving neighborhood one person, one property at a time.

Today Lansdowne UP strives to not only make the Lansdowne neighborhood clean and beautiful, but also to provide jobs, work force development, and housing for those who call East St. Louis home. At Lansdowne UP, we define success as honoring and glorifying God with our lives.

Jeff Bowers Whitefish Bay, WI

A 1980 graduate of Bloomington High School, Jeff Bowers was a four-year wrestler at BHS. He wrestled for his father, IWCOA Hall of Fame Member, National Hall of Fame and Museum-Illinois Chapter Lifetime Service Award Winner Jim Bowers. In 2012, Jeff became the thirteenth IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee whose father is also a member of the IWCOA Hall of Fame. He was a sectional champion as a senior and placed sixth at the state meet at 167 lb. and finished with a 76-24 varsity career record. Jeff was named Chuck Murdoch Central Illinois Outstanding Wrestler in 1980. He also played football and was named to the All-Area Team in baseball.

Jeff went on to attend George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia, where he played baseball while being named to the All-Conference Team. Jeff received his B.S degree in economics in 1985.

Upon his graduation, Jeff returned to Illinois and began serving wrestling as an official where he has established himself as one of the state's elite officials over the past three decades. He received his first IHSA regional tournament assignment 1991 and has worked in 35 regionals since that time. He has also worked 29 individual sectionals and 18 dual team sectionals. In 1999 he was appointed to officiate the IHSA Dual Team State Finals and in 2001 he was appointed his first IHSA Individual State Finals. He has worked 9 dual team and 18 individual state tournaments. Jeff worked the IWCOA Regionals, Sectionals, State Finals held in Springfield during the 2021 COVID season. In addition, Jeff has worked the IESA State Finals 13 times, the IWCOA Championships 4 times, and the IKWF State Finals 2 times. In 2010, 2013 and 2017 Jeff was appointed to officiate the U.S. vs. Illinois All Star Meet.

Jeff served on the IHSA Official's Advisory Committee from 2008-2010. In 2005 and 2013 he was selected as IWCOA Official of the Year and in 2009 the National Federation of High Schools selected Jeff as Illinois Official of the Year. He was inducted into the IWCOA Hall of Fame in 2012.

Jeff currently lives in Whitefish Bay, Wisconsin and serves as Corporate Accounts Manager for Reagent Chemical & Research. Jeff gives special thanks to his family for their love and support while he pursued his passion on the whistle. He has been married to his wife Stephanie for 27 years. Jeff is very proud of his five children: Cheyenne, Cameron, Eli, Caleb, and Chloe. When Jeff is not on the mat he can be found traveling to and attending their many events and contests.

Dave Durlacher Mundelein

Born in Chicago, Dave Durlacher attended Buffalo Grove High School where he competed for IWCOA Hall of Fame Coach Bob Tipsword. With over 100 career wins, Dave was a two-time state qualifier and placed 5th in 1986. Dave had 44 wins as a senior with 16 technical falls. He also placed in both the State Freestyle and State Greco-Roman tournaments which qualified him for the USA Junior Nationals in Fargo. Dave also competed in soccer for four years and gymnastics for one year. He finished his high school career at Buffalo Grove with a record of 108-21-4. He still ranks in the top ten in career wins, team points and winning percentage.

Dave went on to the University of Illinois to wrestle for another IWCOA Hall of Fame coach, Ron Clinton. While at Illinois he was a three-year letter winner and two-year starter. He earned his Bachelor's Degree in Finance.

Dave began coaching in 1991 with the Bison Wrestling Club in Buffalo Grove and he has continued coaching since that time. Being an out of building coach is difficult but Dave has found a way to make it work and continues to give back to our sport. He coached the Bison Wrestling Club for twenty-three years, most of this time as the head coach. He introduced hundreds of boys and girls to this great sport. He coached over 100 state place-winners and many more state qualifiers.

Dave started coaching at the high school level in 1994 when he joined the Buffalo Grove High School wrestling staff as an assistant. During his tenure as an assistant at Buffalo Grove, Dave coached twenty-three state qualifiers and two state place-winners. He later served as the head coach for Buffalo Grove High School from 2006-2014. As the head coach at Buffalo Grove High School, Dave coached one wrestler to a state championship in 2009. He played a major role in the development of all three of Buffalo Grove's state champions. His brother, Lindsey, an IWCOA Hall of Fame member, was the first state champion in Buffalo Grove history.

While working with the Bison Wrestling Club, Dave was instrumental in the development of other north suburban school wrestlers.

Dave moved on to Mundelein High School in 2014 as an assistant coach and remains there today as the head freshman coach. Aside from his son Dane, who was a 2x place winner, Mundelein produced 4 additional all-staters.

During his career, Dave has had a large influence in development of wrestlers in grade school, middle school, high school and off season as well as working with the Poeta Training Center.

Craig Fallico Marist, Gordon Tech, Maine South, Maine West

Craig Fallico attended Loyola Academy and Williams Bay High Schools where he was a three-sport athlete participating in football, wrestling, and baseball. He attended Marquette University and began teaching and coaching within days after graduation in 1981.

Craig's first coaching position was at Marist High School as an assistant varsity wrestling coach and head sophomore football coach. In 1982 he moved to Gordon Tech where he began his 30+ yr partnership with Coach Dennis McCann, IWCOA Hall of Fame Member and National Wrestling Hall of Fame Member. As an assistant, Craig worked and drilled with varsity wrestlers, helped recruit wrestlers from hallways and classes while adding a contagious brand of enthusiasm to the athletes and families of our great sport that he still delivers to this day. As an assistant at Marist, Gordon Tech and at Maine South; his contributions helped to establish numerous individual conference champions, state qualifiers, and state medalists. Not to mention a few Conference and Regional championship teams too.

In 1997 Craig and Dennis flipped roles and for the next 15 years Maine South wrestling enjoyed 10 Central Suburban League championships, a handful of IHSA Regional titles, dozens and dozens of state qualifiers, and numerous state medalists (to include Craig's son Nick). Coach Craig Fallico's Dual Meet record is 268-88, for a .750 winning percentage. He was inducted into the Maine South Athletic Hall of Fame in 2010 and into the IWCOA Hall of Fame in 2012.

For a dozen years Craig Fallico was instrumental in the success of Team Illinois Freestyle and Greco-Roman wrestling. He served as a National Team Coach and Director and he personally sponsored our first Cadet National Dual Team in 2002. Throughout his tenure he traveled throughout the country coaching, directing, managing and supervising Cadet and Junior National teams. He hosted countless tournaments, ran many multi state opens and even represented Illinois as a FILA International referee. Speaking of Craig Fallico as Referee, he was an excellent IHSA Wrestling Official from 2012 to 2019.

Craig is no stranger to youth wrestling! Park Ridge District 64 had no Middle School Wrestling program, so Coach Fallico worked with the intramural wrestling, running clinics, donating mats and equipment, etc. and in 2008 it launched its first official wrestling team. From the 1980's and for more than 40 years he has coached, directed and volunteered in a kids' club. From the Ram Club to the Rosemont Cobras to currently the Maine Eagles, you probably bumped into him at a practice, a camp, and most likely at a tournament. He has hosted numerous kids' tournaments, more than a dozen IKWF Regionals and now cherishes his new role as "consultant"; coaching when needed, recruiting, promoting...being a positive and respected ambassador for our great sport.

Craig's passion and enthusiasm for wrestling, his dedication to athletes who he taught and coached, to kid wrestling still, to his colleagues, is exemplary. His competitive spirit and his work ethic are honored and admired by everyone who knows him.

Craig and his wife Jennie of 42 years, have 5 married children, and 7 grandchildren. Craig likes to say that he has a great life: he works and sees his grandkids, what could be better? He is proud of his 30+ year coaching career, his 30+ year teaching career, and his current 43 yr Real Estate Career. But Craig is most proud of his wife and family, and of the love that he shared and received over many decades through wrestling.

Will Gaddy Woodstock

Born in Bloomington, IL in 1957, Will Gaddy attended University High School in Normal, IL. While at U-High, he wrestled for Hall of Fame Coach George Girardi and was a two-time state place-winner, placing 3rd at 167 lb. in 1977 and winning the 185 lb. State Championship in 1978. He had a career record of 64-11-1. A three-sport athlete, Will was team captain in wrestling, football and baseball. He was all conference in both football and baseball and was a two-time conference champion in wrestling. He earned a total of 7 varsity letters in football, wrestling and baseball for the Pioneers and was MVP on the baseball team.

Upon graduation from U-High, Will attended Western Illinois University and wrestled for Dan Triveline. He earned his BS in Education from Illinois State University in 1988 and his MA in Education from North Park in 2003.

In 1989-90 wrestling season, Will took the role as head wrestling coach at Oak Park (Fenwick) and served as their coach for six years. He capped of the 1994-94 season with an 11-0 conference record in the CCL and was 14-5 overall. The Friars were Conference Dual Meet Champions and Will was name CCL Coach of the Year. His teams at Fenwick finished with a 48-74-1 dual meet record.

Will assumed the head coach position at McHenry at the start of the 1995-96 season. During the next twenty-one seasons at the helm of the Warriors, Will coached four unbeaten Fox Valley Conference teams. The 2012-13

McHenry team put together a perfect 23-0 season. His dual meet record at McHenry was 295-135 and his total career record was 343-209-1. Over his 27-season coaching career, Will had nineteen winning seasons, 2 regional championship squad and six conference championships. He coached 30 state qualifiers, 9 state place-winners and 3 state runners-up. In addition to being selected as 1995 Chicago Catholic League Coach of the Year, Will was named 2000 Northwest Herald Coach of the Year.

Since his retirement as head coach, Will has served as an assistant coach for the Crystal Lake Wizards (2015-2017) and Marian Central Catholic (2017-2020). He helped coach Marian Central to a 3rd place finish in the 2019 IHSA Dual Team State Championships. In 2019 Will coached his son to the 182 lb. IWCOA Fresh-Soph State Championship.

Will has been a Physical Education teacher for the past 36 years at Fenwick, McHenry and currently at Marian Central in Woodstock.

Connie Kessen Rochelle

Connie Kessen was born and raised in Rochelle. She originally was brought into the sport of wrestling through her brother Chuck who was a 167lb wrestler for Rochelle Township High School during the early 1980's. From that point on she fell in love with the sport, a love which only grew when her son, IWCOA Hall of Fame official and past-president Nate Kessen, began wresting.

Connie attended Rochelle Township High School and Kishwaukee College. She was a softball player, playing competitively in the elite circuit well into her 20's. She also coached youth softball for many years where she consistently produced championship caliber teams.

Throughout the past 40 years, Connie has served as a volunteer, organizer, bench official, bracket master, scorekeeper, timer, club director, coach, and most of all a fan and supporter of the sport. She has volunteered at the IHSA Individual State Wrestling Finals for the past two decades serving as a bench official, scorer, timer, and supporting the grand march organizing. For the past 10 years she has volunteered at the IHSA Dual Team championships in the same capacity, also working as a weigh-in official. She has volunteered at every Girls High School State Finals ever hosted, including those hosted by the IWCOA.

For the past 15 years Connie has served and supported the IWCOA in many capacities. She received a silver award in 2016 and again in 2019. From 2010 until her retirement she served as the IWCOA banquet programs printer, in 2011 bringing both the Hall of Fame and All-State program to their current color format. For the past two decades, she has served as a tournament worker and volunteer extraordinaire at the annual IWCOA championships held in Springfield, including volunteering for all 6 days of tournaments during the 2021 COVID season championships.

Connie served as a volunteer board member with the Rochelle Wrestling Club for 20 years, including serving as the club director for 15 years. She was an active member within the north section for both the IKWF and IWF, serving on many committees and as an alternate sectional director. During this time, she also coached and cornered wrestlers who specifically asked for her in their matches. Even after she passed the reigns of the Rochelle club onto her successors, she continued to volunteer at regular and postseason tournaments hosted by

the club. For her dedication and impact, she received a Lifetime Service award from the Rochelle Wrestling Club Board of Directors. In addition, she served on the high school boosters helping organize fundraisers, concession stands and working conference and IHSA postseason tournaments that the school hosts. To this day she continues to travel to support the team at various dual meets and tournaments, and volunteers at any tournaments the program hosts. In 2024 the Rochelle High School program presented Connie with their Lifetime Service award.

For 31 years, Connie worked at Kishwaukee College where she managed the campus printing and mail services. During her time at Kish, she served as union president for 3 successful collective bargaining terms and then became an advisor as she moved into professional administration. She retired from Kish in 2020. For the past 39 years she has volunteered and worked at HOPE of Ogle County, a domestic violence agency. She continues to serve in the same capacity.

Connie lives in Rochelle where she continues to support her local sports teams. When she is not volunteering at a wrestling event she can be found spending time with her three granddaughters.

Shane Morgan Oswego

Shane Morgan was born in Aurora and raised in Oswego. He started competing in the sport of wrestling at the age of 11 while in the 6th grade attending Traughber Junior High School in Oswego.

Moving onto Oswego High School Shane stayed with the sport and wrestled as a freshman. He weighed a mere 90 lbs and it was difficult to find other wrestlers that were his size, so he only wrestled 5 matches in which he went undefeated that freshman season. Moving onto his sophomore year Shane made the Varsity wrestling team, wrestling at the 98 pound weight class. He started 3 years on the Varsity at Oswego compiling a record of 104-29. Shane was a 3 time Little Seven All-Conference wrestler while earning the conference championship title at 112 pounds his senior year, wrestling up a weight class for his team in an attempt to win the team crown. He was a two-time regional champion, placed 3rd at sectionals as senior, and went on to Champaign where he earned all-state recognition taking 4th at the 105 pound weight class in 1986. Shane would like to make special mention to a man that had a great impact on his life and thinks of him like a second father, John Sammons. John was Shane's head coach at Oswego and is the all-time coaching wins leader for Oswego High School.

Shane wanted to wrestle in college however a nagging shoulder injury ended his career. Moving on from this Shane began his current 38 year and counting career entering the building trades where he joined Carpenters Union Local 1307 in 1987.

In 1992, Shane married his high school sweetheart Shelley. Ironically, this same year Shane began his current 33year career as an IHSA official. He entered the officiating ranks to stay involved in the sport and to give back to the sport that gave him so much in his life. Shane credits wrestling for all of his accomplishments in life, he feels it saved him from wandering down the wrong direction in life and molded the strong work ethic Shane still exudes to this day.

Shane was assigned his 1st IHSA regional in 1997 and has since officiated 28 IHSA regionals, 23 IHSA Individual Sectional Tournaments, 20 Dual Team Sectionals. Shane has worked a combined 48 IHSA individual, Dual team/Girl, IESA, IWCOA, and IKWF State Tournaments. He has served as the Head Official for the IESA State

Tournament and is a member of the IESA Wrestling Advisory Board. In addition, Shane has officiated 2 IWCOA Illinois/Indiana Classic Duals. He was also selected to officiate the USA vs. Illinois All-Star Dual. In 2009, Shane was selected as the IWCOA and IHSA Official of the Year. Currently, Shane is an IHSA Rules Interpreter and Clinician, a post which he has held for the past 15 years.

Shane resides in Oswego with his wife of 32 years Shelley and their three sons Devin, Jack, and Chase. Shane would like to acknowledge a special thanks to his wife and family for all their support as he spends a lot of time away giving back to the sport that he loves dearly.

Khris Whelan Granite City, Univ of Missouri, Blackburn College

A 1978 graduate of Granite City North High School, Khris Whelan was a three-time district and sectional champion and three-time Illinois High School Association state place-winner. He won a state title in 1977, placed second in 1978 and finished fourth in 1976. He had a three-year varsity record of 114-5 with 78 pins.

While in high school, Khris was a five-time USA Wrestling Junior National finalist and a four-time champion. Twice he was named the tournament's Outstanding Wrestler and twice he won the Most Falls award. At the age of 15, he was the fourth man on the ladder of the 1976 United States Olympic Greco-Roman team.

Following high school, Khris attended the University of Missouri and was the team captain and Outstanding Wrestler during the 1982-83 season. He became a four-time NCAA Division I tournament qualifier and two-time All-American at 126 and 134 pounds. He became Missouri's first wrestler to earn a #1 ranking, was a Midlands Champion, and was selected as the Outstanding Wrestler in the East-West All Star Meet.

From 1987 through 1994, Khris was the assistant coach at Missouri, developing eight Division I All-Americans and five Big 8 and Big 12 conference champions.

He was the assistant men's national freestyle coach for Great Britain from 1994 through 1997 and was also the head women's freestyle coach for that country.

From 1997 to 2000, he was the co-head wrestling coach at Hazelwood Central High School in St. Louis, where his teams had eight state place-winners and two state champions while finishing second in the state in 1999. Khris also coached for three years Southern Illinois-Edwardsville.

While coaching a Cahokia from 2000-2025 Kris's tams won three conference championships and three regional titles. He coached one state champion and four state finalists as well as 3 other state place-winners. Kris retired from Cahokia as a business education teacher in 2021.

In 2023 Khris took over the helm of the newly created wrestling program at Blackburn College. He was instrumental in the starting of the Men's and Women's wrestling program at Blackburn. He has just retired from that position at the end of the 2025 season.

Khris was inducted into the Illinois Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association Hall of Fame in 2001 and into the University of Missouri-Columbia Athletic Hall of Fame in 2010. In 2016 he was recognized by the Illinois Chapter of the National Wrestling Hall of Fame for Lifetime Service to Wrestling.

Outside of wrestling, he has been a U.S. National judo champion, holding a third-degree black belt. When he's not coaching at Cahokia or at his Nation's Best Wrestling Academy in the St. Lous/Granite City metro area, Khris is a master instructor for the British Combat Association in the art of self-defense and a national law enforcement trainer.

The IWCOA would like to congratulate all 2025 Lifetime Service Award inductees. Your dedication to wrestling will forever be remembered.

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Jason Clay, Vandalia Coach

Jason Clay stepped down as the head coach at Vandalia following a great run of success in which his program went 504-110 in 19 seasons since 2006-07 during which time the Vandals qualified for the IHSA Dual Team Finals on 15 occasions and captured six trophies, with three of those being for second-place finishes.

His 2024-25 team went 40-2 and its only loss to an Illinois team came in his final dual meet, when Coal City won 32-25 over the Vandals in the title meet of the IHSA Class 1A Dual Team State Tournament in Bloomington, giving the Coalers their second state title in three years.

Jason and the program had three IHSA champions for the first in its history when Tyson Waughtel, the state's alltime wins leader, took first place at 126 pounds to win his third title and first for the Vandals and Max Philpot added a title at 113 pounds as both finished unbeaten.

One week later, Sophie Bowers won her second-straight IHSA title at 125 pounds and she also finished unbeaten. She became the first individual in the new IHSA format to win a state title who was also on a team that was trying to capture a state championship.

That equaled the number of state champions that he had before the State Finals. The team just missed having another champion as Preston Waughtel lost 2-1 in the 120 finals. Jason also had career-bests for most medalists with seven and most qualifiers with 12.

He finished his career with 119 qualifiers, 44 placewinners and six champions, with Jo-E Smith (2007-157 in A) and Jarek Wehrle (2021 - 106 in IWCOA) being the other two boys title winners. He was selected as the IWCOA Coach of the Year in both 2016 and 2024.

In his first season, the Vandals lost 30-29 to Wilmington in the 2007 Class A title meet and in 2018, Vandalia fell 48-18 to Aurora Christian in the Class 1A title meet. They also took third place in 2019 and fourth place in both 2016 and 2024. The Vandals also qualified for the Dual Team Finals in 2008, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2017 and 2022 and won regional titles in each season, except for 2023.

Jason has also been the Vandals head football coach for the past nine seasons and they've gone 69-24 with eight IHSA playoff teams and three conference champions. He's taught Geography for 18 years and been Vandalia's athletic director for seven years and is also the district's athletic director. In the 2026-27 school year, he will become Vandalia's principal.

He competed for Vandalia in wrestling from 1996-98 and went 41-10 and was a state qualifier in his senior season of 1998 for coach Glenn Exton, a 2014 IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee. Jason also played football for Vandalia and was a two-time all-conference selection as well as being a two-time all-area honoree. Jason attended McKendree College in Lebanon and played football there and graduated in 2002 with a Bachelor's Degree of Arts in Secondary Education.

Ryan Cumbee, Providence Catholic/Northwestern University Joliet Catholic Academy Wrestler/Coach

Ryan Cumbee competed at Providence Catholic High School in New Lenox from 1995-1999 for coach Keith Healy, a 2006 IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee. He went 168-22 during his career and placed three times at the IHSA Individual Tournament Finals, taking first place in Class AA at 135 pounds in 1999, fourth place at 125 pounds in 1998 and third place at 112 pounds in 1997.

He was also a member of three-straight Celtics teams that won IHSA Class AA Dual Team Championships in 1997, 1998 and 1999 after finishing in third place in 1996. During those four seasons, Providence Catholic went 108-10-1 in dual meets. That was the start of an historic streak in which the program captured six-straight IHSA Class AA championships. Ryan was a two-time team MVP and a two-time team captain. As a senior, he was selected as the Chicago Tribune's Athletes of the Month in February, 1999. He also won multiple Illinois Freestyle titles.

Ryan then went on to compete at Northwestern University in Evanston for coach Tim Cysewski, a 1991 IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee. He went 29-15 as a Wildcat and served as a team captain and led his team in pins, wins and takedowns. He graduated from Northwestern in 2003 with a Bachelor's of Science Degree in Communication.

After college, Ryan returned to Providence Catholic to serve as an assistant coach for Keith Healy from 2002-2011, and during that time the Celtics placed second in Class AA in the IHSA Dual Team Finals in 2003, 2004 and 2008. During those seasons, the Celtics went 202-24-1.

Ryan began his head coaching career at Marmion Academy in Aurora where his Cadets went 25-4 in 2012-13 and lost 38-17 to Carl Sandburg in the Class 3A title meet at the Dual Team Finals. In 2013-14, Marmion went 15-4 and placed third in Class 3A. In 2014-15, The Cadets were 16-3 and lost in the 3A quarterfinals. He had a 56-11 record in three seasons at Marmion.

In 2017-18, Ryan took over as head coach at Joliet Catholic Academy and by his third year, he led the Hilltoppers to their first regional title and from 2021-22 through this season, the program has made four-straight appearances in the IHSA Dual Team Finals. His 2021-22 team posted a 17-1 record and beat Deerfield 39-33 to win the IHSA Class 2A title. He was selected as the IWCOA Class 2A Coach of the Year in 2022.

In 2022-23, Ryan's Hilltoppers went 15-8 and were edged by Washington 28-27 in the Class 2A title meet. His 2023-24 team had a 14-4 record and lost in the Class 3A quarterfinals. And his 2024-25 team went 10-11 and took third place in Class 3A. He has a 96-52 record in seven seasons at JCA and a 152-63 overall record in 10 seasons.

During his career, Ryan has coached 70 state qualifiers, 45 placewinners and 17 champions. He also coached Team Illinois at the Illinois-Indiana All-Star Duals that JCA hosted in 2025 and is the owner and head coach of the youth wrestling program, Callan Wrestling Academy.

Nick Fanthorpe, Naperville North/Iowa State University Wrestler

Nick Fanthorpe started wrestling at eight years old for the Naperville Wrestling Club. He later joined the Fox Valley Wrestling Club and Martinez Fox Valley Elite Club under coach Jose Martinez. Nick was a four-time IKWF State Champion and was the recipient of the Outstanding Wrestler Award his final season.

He went on to wrestle at Naperville North under coaches Tom Champion, Tom Arlis, a 2008 IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee, and assistant coach John Fiore. Nick finished his high school career with a record of 155-10, was a three-time Class AA state finalist and two-time state champion, winning in 2003 at 103 pounds and in 2005 at 119 pounds, while taking second at 112 pounds in 2004. He earned the Class AA Outstanding Wrestler Award his senior season.

Nick attended Iowa State University where he qualified for the NCAA Championships each year. During his career at Iowa State, he achieved All-American honors in 2008 at 133 pounds. He was a two-time Big 12 Champion (2008 and 2009 at 133 pounds) and a three-time Team Big 12 Champion (2007-2009).

He earned his Bachelor of Science Degree in Community and Regional Planning and was selected to the Academic All-Big 12 first team and was a NWCA Scholar All-American (2008, 2009 and 2010). Nick was also the recipient of the team's annual Total Commitment Award all four years that he competed for Iowa State.

He was coached at Iowa State by Cael Sanderson, Bobby Douglas, Kevin Jackson and assistant coaches Cody Sanderson, Casey Cunningham and Chris Bono.

Following his college career Nick wrestled for the Nittany Lion Wrestling Club in State College, Pennsylvania. He was a 2011 World Teams Trials qualifier at 60 kg and a 2014 World Teams Trials 5th place finisher at 65 kg.

He joined the Penn State University wrestling staff from 2012-2014 as an assistant coach where they received the Big Ten and NCAA team championships both years.

Nick currently resides in Naperville with his wife, Erin, and son, Wells.

Michael Grimes, Montini Catholic/Northern Illinois University Wrestler

Michael Grimes is a native of Lombard and he began wrestling in 1993 for the Little Broncos Wrestling Club at Montini Catholic High School, led by head coach Mike Bukovsky, a 2020 IWCOA Lifetime Service Award Winner. By age 10, he learned the importance of good "ankle pick defense" from assistant coach Jeff Bukovsky.

The Bukovsky brothers helped forge the path for Michael's rise from an IKWF state qualifier to an IHSA Class A state champion at 119 pounds in 2001 and at 130 pounds in 2002 and as a member of Montini Catholic's IHSA Class A state champion teams in 2000 and in 2002, when he was a captain.

Michael graduated from Northern Illinois University, where he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Accountancy and a Master of Science degree in Management Information Systems. During his time at Northern Illinois, Michael was a three-time captain of the wrestling team, an NCAA Division I National Qualifier in 2005 and a Midlands Champion.

After Northern Illinois, Michael went on to work as a forensic Auditor at the U.S. Government and Accountability Office (GAO) in Washington, D.C., where he obtained his license as a Certified Public Accountant.

In 2009, Michael commissioned in the United States Navy. First assigned to the United States Naval Academy as a Physical Fitness Instructor and wrestling coach under head coach Bruce Burnett, Michael ultimately became the head wrestling coach at the United States Naval Academy Preparatory School.

There, he was charged with developing young student-athletes' moral, mental, and physical strength and to prepare them for the rigors of the United States Naval Academy. Michael coached multiple National Collegiate Wrestling Association (NCWA) All-Americans and National Champions, including former Montini Catholic state champion, now Major Colton Rasche. Nine of Michael's wrestlers are now Navy Seals.

Michael went on to obtain his Juris Doctorate at the Washington College of Law at American University where he served as the volunteer wrestling coach under head coach Teague Moore. Following Law School, Michael began working as an attorney in the Division of Enforcement at the U.S. Securities and Exchange, and he was affiliated with the Navy Reserve.

In 2016, Michael mobilized to support Combined Joint Task Force-Operation Inherent Resolve, where he supported the Commander's Staff Judge Advocate's office as the officer-in-charge for tracking, assessing and investigating civilian casualty allegations in Iraq and Syria.

Michael is currently serving on active duty as the Deputy Manager for the U.S. Navy Reserve Judge Advocate General Corps, and he is an Adjunct Assistant Professor at American University's Washington College of Law.

Chad Hay, Sandwich/University of Illinois/Mahomet-Seymour/Conant Wrestler/Coach

Chad Hay has enjoyed success as a wrestler at Sandwich High School, in college at the University of Illinois, in high school coaching for 20 years with stops at Mahomet-Seymour, Conant and Lake Zurich high schools and also at the kids club level for 16 years.

He was a two-time IHSA Class A champion in 1996 and 1997 at Sandwich for coach Lon Gerrish, a 2013 recipient of the IWCOA's Lifetime Achievement Award. Chad also took fourth in A in 1995 and finished his four-year career with a 128-15 record with 50 pins.

Chad was also captain for Sandwich's 1996-97 team that won the IHSA A Dual Team Title and the 1995-96 team that was the state runner-up. He was a two-time conference wrestler of the year and won the IWCOA Scholastic Wrestler of the Year Award in 1997.

He went on to compete at the University of Illinois for coaches Mark Johnson, Jim Heffernan, Steve Marianetti and Adam Tirapelle. In 2002, he was an NCAA DI National Qualifier who placed in the top 16 at the NCAA Finals and he also took fourth in the Big Ten Tournament.

A four-time letter winner for the Illini from 1999-2002, he also won the Fighting Illini Spirit Award and Big Ten Wrestler of the Week Awards in 2002. A Midlands Placewinner in 1999 and 2000, he was a recipient of the Eric Siebert Most Courageous Award for saving the lives of an elderly couple from a burning building. He graduated

with a Bachelor's degree from the University of Illinois in 2002 and earned a Master's Degree from Northern Illinois University in 2011. He competed in Olympic weightlifting competitions in 2001-2002.

Chad was the head coach and a math teacher at Mahomet-Seymour High School from 2002-2006, then moved to Conant High School in Hoffman Estates, where he's been a math teacher since 2006. He served as the boys wrestling head coach at Conant from 2009-2021 and the school's girls head coach from 2017-2021. In 2024, he became head coach of the girls program at Lake Zurich High School and he has been a member of the Illinois Girls Wrestling Coaching Alliance since 2018.

In his 20 years as a head coach, he's collected 210 dual meet wins. He led Conant to third place in Class 3A in 2021 in the IHSA Dual Team Finals and also had teams that advanced to state in 2014 and 2017. Chad had eight teams win regional titles, six teams win conference titles and he was honored five times as the Mid-Suburban League West Coach of the Year. He has had 47 individual qualifiers, seven placewinners, one state champion and one Freestyle champion for his boys teams and six qualifiers and six placewinners, including three runners-up for the girls.

Since 2009, he's coached kid's clubs, including 12 seasons with the Conant Jr. Cougars. Since 2021, Chad has coached with the Lake Zurich Cubs, where has enjoyed coaching his three daughters, Georgia, Fiona and Eleanora.

Curt Herron, Lockport Contributor

Curt Herron attended Lockport Township High School where he began writing about high school sports as a junior in 1980. He graduated from the University Illinois at Urbana-Champaign with a Bachelor's Degree in Journalism from the College of Communications in 1986 and started covering high school sports on a regular basis for The Star Newspapers in Chicago Heights.

He found his next job while working at the Sears store in Joliet. A co-worker convinced him to join Wayne Perry's Plainfield Enterprise so he could report on her son, a wrestler at Plainfield High School, and he was there from 1995-2000. Curt learned everything about the sport from Wildcats coach Mike Zbacnik, a 2002 IWCOA Hall of Famer, and his assistant, Marc Miller, who's now a top official. They nominated Curt for the first two of his 10 nominations for the Newsman of the Year Award, which he shared with The News-Gazette's Fred Kroner in 2000.

Curt returned to The Star Newspapers to report on the south suburbs, and he worked there from 2000-2008 for Al Macey, who allowed him to write a lot about the sport, which included covering many tournaments and running weekly honor rolls while also assisting the Daily Southtown with its wrestling coverage. He was recognized with his second Newsman of the Year Award in 2002.

Thanks to reporting on wrestling, Curt built a friendship that continues with Gary Larsen and Mike Garofola, a 2023 IWCOA Hall of Famer. They came up with the idea to start websites for soccer and wrestling, Chicagoland Soccer and Chicagoland Wrestling. Chicagoland Soccer got a boost from the soccer coaches association who gave it their top honor, Soccer Person of the Year, in 2009 and 2010. Dave Surico, who met them while covering wrestling for the Chicago Tribune, owns Chicagoland Soccer, a unique site sponsored by programs and Curt writes for it.

Curt got the opportunity to write about the sport at the state level for a few years thanks to Mike Bare's Illinois Matmen, and he received the Newsman of the Year Award in 2013. The next year, he began working for Dick Goss at Joliet's Herald-News and stayed there until 2020. He again was allowed to write extensively and received the Newsman of the Year Award again in 2018.

In 2021, Curt reunited with Larsen and Garofola, thanks to the support of 2016 IWCOA Hall of Famer Mick Torres, to write tournament stories for the IWCOA website. An advocate for girls sports throughout his career, Curt is proud that he reported on the first IHSA girls tournaments and he's covered the most girls events. He's grateful to write in-depth tournament stories and roundups for all of Illinois and Curt won the Newsman of the Year Award for a fifth time in 2023.

Also in 2021, he was hired by the Joliet Area Historical Museum, where he's the go-to guy at the first Route 66 welcome center. A big fan of sports history, Curt was co-author of 100 Years of Madness, The IHSA Boys' Basketball Tournament, in 2006. He thanks his family, the athletes, coaches, athletic directors, officials, parents, fans and reporters he's known through the years.

Michael Kimberlin, Bishop McNamara/Northwestern University/Minooka Wrestler/Coach

A standout at Bishop McNamara High School in Kankakee, Michael Kimberlin was dominant on the wrestling mat as well as on the football field. During his tenure on the mat, he was a three-time Chicago Catholic League champion and took second in 1999. In his senior year of 2000-2001, he was honored with the distinction of being a recipient of the Lawless Award.

Michael was all-state four times in Class A, placing third at 140 pounds in 1998, second at 152 pounds in 1999 and winning IHSA titles at 152 pounds in both 2000 and 2001. He never allowed an opponent a takedown in 35 matches during his senior year and has a combined record of 145-14 during his high school career. In 2001, Michael earned the honor of being a Cliff Keen High School All-American.

In football, Michael was an all-conference selection three times and made the Illinois High School All-State team in 2000. Michael helped lead his team to a second-place finish to Glenwood at the IHSA Class 4A Finals in 1998.

During the second round of the playoffs in 2000, he rushed for 325 yards on 60 carries and scored four touchdowns against Normal Community, His rushing attempts is still an IHSA record for playoff games in all classes and his rushing yardage was an IHSA record at the time. And it's tied for the sixth-best total in the nation in any game.

After graduating from high school, Michael earned his Bachelor's Degree from Northwestern University where he was a four-year letter winner in wrestling and an NCAA qualifier at 157 pounds in 2004. Later, he received his Master's degree at Olivet Nazarene University, and during that time, he spent two years coaching wrestling at Lincoln-Way Central High School.

After earning a teaching position at Washington Junior High and Academy in Joliet, Michael spent eight years coaching wrestling with his father, Dale, and his brother, Jake Kimberlin, at Bishop McNamara. In 2016, Michael was inducted into the prestigious Chicago Catholic League Hall of Fame.

To date, Michael has helped contribute to the success of 20 state qualifiers, 15 state placers, six IHSA state champions, and two IHSA Elite 8 Dual Team appearances. Currently, Michael is teaching and coaching wrestling at Minooka High School.

Doug Klein, Ida Crown Jewish Academy Coach

For 33 seasons, Doug Klein has served as the head coach of the Ida Crown Jewish Academy wrestling team. Because of the school's challenging curriculum and its abiding by Jewish law and the Sabbath, his teams have been unable to compete from Friday evening until Saturday evening, but the Skokie school has had a competitive program with tough wrestlers.

Doug is from Tidewater, Virginia, the home of the Granby School of Wrestling. He wrestled 98 pounds and 112 pounds at Western Branch High School in Chesapeake, Va. He was a hard worker and joined the cross country team in order to prepare for wrestling season. He won the Most Dedicated Wrestler Award his senior year.

Following high school, Doug attended The College of William & Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia. He walked onto the wrestling team and spent countless hours in the wrestling room and learned technique and wrestling strategies along the way. As a student, he was a finalist for a Rhodes Scholarship and a member of several academic honor societies. After graduating, Doug attended law school, also at William & Mary.

Doug joined a law firm in downtown Chicago, but missed the sport and the team dynamic. With a stroke of good fortune in 1992, he stumbled into the head coaching job at Ida Crown. At the time, the team was a second year program, one largely considered a joke by the larger student body. When Doug took the job, the team had a dozen wrestlers.

Applying the discipline and team ethos in which he was cultivated, the team had only four wrestlers for his second season as head coach. The team has grown from there. At one point, approximately one third of the boys in the school (out of 250) were on the wrestling team.

Over the years, Doug has amassed a dual meet record of 209-315. Ida Crown has produced a number of regional champions and dozens of sectional qualifiers. Four Ida Crown wrestlers have appeared in the Class 1A state rankings - a significant achievement given the lack of regular season opportunities against other ranked competitors.

In 2007, the IHSA moved a 1A regional tournament to Saturday night so that Ida Crown could participate. The team has performed admirably in this competition, and in 2012 claimed the regional title and thereby qualifying for the state dual team title.

Since 1996, Ida Crown has participated in the Henry Wittenberg Wrestling Invitational in the New York area, a competition which serves as the national championship for Jewish high schools. Ida Crown teams have won this competition 10 times, most recently in 2025.

In 2008, Doug was named Educator of the Year by Ida Crown. After the 2024 Wittenberg Championship, the Village of Skokie designated April 4, 2024 as 'Coach Doug Klein Day'.

Dr. Dan McDonnell, Morris Official

Dr. Dan McDonnell began his wrestling career at Morrison High School under 2013 IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee coach Dan Drosopoulos. At Morrison, he was the first freshman to win a regional title and first to be a four-time regional champion and he placed fourth in Class A at 112 pounds in 1987.

Dan ended his high school career with the school career victory record of 128-26-1 and held the record until 2012 when one of his nephews and a two-time state champion, Mark McDonnell, eclipsed it with a 136-15 record, and his other nephew and a state champion, Matt McDonnell, came close with a 118-30 record.

Dan began officiating wrestling upon graduating high school in 1988, with his older brother, wrestling state qualifier and state official, Bob McDonnell. Following the death of his father and paying for college on his own, he attended Sauk Valley Community College and then transferred to Illinois State University and walked onto the wrestling team. Dan wrestled the remainder of his college eligibility of three years at ISU, earning a varsity letter.

He began his teaching and coaching career at Prairie Central High School, and then became head coach at William Penn College in Oskaloosa, Iowa.

Dan returned to Illinois as the head coach at Ottawa Township High School for seven years, earning a coaching record of 103-44-2. He had two state medalists, Casey Carrino (second in AA at 130 in 2003) and Matt Harding (third in AA at 189 in 2002) and 10 state qualifiers.

While coaching at Ottawa, Dan completed his doctorate in Education Administration and Leadership in 2003 from DePaul University in Chicago. In 2004-05, Dan moved up in school administration, gave up coaching, and returned to officiating wrestling.

Since then, Dan has officiated five IHSA Dual Team and five IHSA Individual State Tournaments. In 2022, Dan became an IHSA Wrestling Clinician.

In 2022, Dan's daughter, Ella, placed fourth at 105 pounds in the first IHSA Girls Wrestling Tournament in 2022, was fourth at 110 pounds in 2023 and also qualified for state in 2024 for Morris Community High School. His son, Eli, plays soccer as a sophomore at Morris. Dan has been married for 22 years to his wife, Anne, a school administrator, and they live in Morris.

Bob McGuinn, Grant/Eastern Illinois University Wrestler

Bob McGuinn followed up on a fine career at Grant High School in Fox Lake that also featured plenty of success in both high school and offseason competition by not only being an NCAA Division II individual champion and a three-time All-American at Eastern Illinois University but he also helped the program to three-straight top-three team finishes in the NCAA Division II Finals, including one year when the Panthers missed winning the championship by less than one point.

Bob's best season with EIU was in 1978-79 when he was a sophomore and won the NCAA Division II championship at 134 pounds with a 20-9 victory over Nebraska-Omaha's Gary Baldwin in the title match in the

event, that was held at South Dakota State University in Brookings, South Dakota. As a result, he was able to advance to the NCAA Division I Finals.

The Panthers scored 112.5 points in the competition, which was one-quarter point behind champion Cal State University-Bakersfield, who scored 112.75 to claim its third title in four years and it started a run of five-straight titles for CSUB that was halted by SIU-Edwardsville in 1984.

He is the fifth IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee who was All-American on that team. The others were Bob Holland (2001), Geno Savegnago (1998), Dave Klemm (1998) and Ralph McCausland (1996). A hall of famer in soccer, Randy Blackman (2018) and Bob Stout were the other All-American for EIU in its best-ever NCAA II showing.

Bob claimed third place at 134 pounds in 1980 and finished in sixth place at 134 pounds in 1978. In 1978 and 1980, Eastern Illinois took third place in the competition. The Panthers coach during that run of success was Ron Clinton, a 1998 IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee. Bob went 91-20-1 during his career with the Panthers and graduated from Eastern Illinois University in 1983 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education.

At Grant High School, Bob competed for coach Don Rowden, a 1995 IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee. He went 122-15-2 during his career, with the highlight being a third-place finish at 138 pounds in the IHSA AA Finals in 1977 to cap a 43-2 senior season. Also in 1977, Bob was a state champion in both Freestyle and Greco-Roman in the offseason.

Bob taught for three years at Lake Zurich High School and also coached there and he also taught and coached at Bolingbrook High School for one season. He has also been a longtime volunteer for coach Mark Masters' Coal City Coalers, who won the IHSA Class 1A Dual Team title this season. He owns and operates a landscaping business in Braceville.

Jason Potter, St. Charles East/University of Illinois Wrestler/Coach

Jason Potter has definitely established a high standard for wrestling in St. Charles not only as an athlete at St. Charles High School but also in coaching at the school that he attended, St. Charles East High School, as a coach.

Jason became the first two-time IHSA state champion for the Fighting Saints in 1999 when he captured his second-straight Class AA championship at 171 pounds after finishing fourth at 152 pounds in his sophomore season. He posted a 126-7 record during those three seasons.

He also was a member of the school's first team that advanced to the IHSA Dual Team Finals in 1997 that lost to eventual Clas AA champion Providence Catholic in the semifinals before winning 25-24 over Waubonsie Valley to claim third place and the program's first trophy, which was coached by Mick Ruettiger, a 2020 recipient of the IWCOA's Lifetime Service Award.

Then as a coach, he led his 2022-23 team to a 22-1 record and its first IHSA title after they defeated Marmion Academy 28-24 for the Class 3A championship. The next season, he led another team to the Dual Team Finals and they finished 22-1 after claiming third place in 3A, the first time the Fighting Saints had advanced to state in consecutive years.

Jason has also had the opportunity during the last few seasons to coach three individuals who won multiple state titles: Ben Davino (2021-2024), a four-time high school state champion (three-time IHSA champion and 2021 IWCOA title winner); Dom Munaretto (2022-2025), currently a two-time IHSA champion and three-time finalist; and Jayden Colon (2022-2024), a two-time IHSA title winner.

He started his career with the St. Charles Wrestling Club when he was five years old, and continues to coach with the club to this day.

Following his high school career, Jason went on to be a four-year letter winner from 2001-2004 for the University of Illinois, where he competed for IWCOA Hall of Fame coaches Mark Johnson and Jim Heffernan. Those teams all finished in the top 10 at the NCAA Tournament. Jason was an NCAA qualifier in 2002 and was one of three captains during his senior season.

He began his coaching career at Leyden High School in Franklin Park and he went 106-37 in his seven seasons with the Eagles. In 2012, he became the head coach at St. Charles East and now has had 19-straight winning seasons in his 20-year career. This was his 13th season with the Fighting Saints and his teams have gone 262-48 while his career record is 368-85.

His 2022-23 state championship team set several school records, with 11 state qualifiers, nine medalists, four finalists and three champions. He received the IWCOA's Class 3A Head Coach of the Year Award in 2023.

Mickey Pruitt, Chicago Contributor

Mickey Pruitt is definitely a Chicago southside success story. A top football player at Robeson High School, he got the opportunity to continue his career at the University of Colorado where he had a hall of fame career. Then he made it to the National Football League and played for the Chicago Bears and the Dallas Cowboys, where he was on a team that won the Super Bowl before also being an assistant coach in college football.

With such an impressive resume, it's understandable why there was a strong interest in getting Mickey involved with helping to administer sports at high schools and grammar schools in Chicago and that's what he's done 27 years as the Senior Director of Sports Administration for the Chicago Public Schools. He's retiring from CPS at the end of the school year and is also handling duties as the acting Executive Director of CPS since September.

His experiences of being an athlete in CPS has driven him to assure that more resources would be provided, more opportunities would be available, and coaches and school administrations would continue to improve and that's what has happened in his tenure as sports administrator.

One of Mickey's biggest influences has been his high school coach at Robeson, Roy Curry, who won 240 games between 1969-2000 and was inducted into the Illinois High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame while he was still coaching in 1992.

Mickey and his teammates made history in 1982 when Robeson advanced to the IHSA Class 5A title game and was leading Rockford Guilford, but a late turnover resulted in a 16-12 defeat. It's the only time that a CPS team has been able to accomplish that feat and Mickey played throughout the entire game as a running back and defensive back.

Another inspirational and hall of fame coach that Mickey got to play for was Bill McCartney, who turned around the fortunes at Colorado and led it to a share of the national title in 1990.

Mickey was a four-year letter winner as a strong safety for the Buffaloes from 1984-87 and one of seven players in the program's history to be a three-time first-team all-conference selection and was a second-team All-American in his senior season. He was selected as a member of Colorado's All-Century Team and the Big Eight All-Decade Team for the 1980s. In 2021, Mickey was inducted into University of Colorado Athletic Hall of Fame.

He played 62 games in the NFL and was with the Bears from 1988-90 and the Dallas Cowboys from 1991-92. He won the Brian Piccolo Award as a rookie for the Bears and received a Super Bowl ring when the Cowboys beat Buffalo 52-17 in Super Bowl XXVII.

Mickey was a graduate assistant at Colorado in 1995 and 1996 and then became an assistant coach at the University of Hawai'i. He also worked in player personnel for the Bears before being hired by CPS in 1998.

Sean Reynolds, Providence Catholic Wrestler

Sean Reynolds wrestled at Providence Catholic High School in New Lenox for 2006 IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee Keith Healy. He was a three-time IHSA state placewinner, finishing third at 130 in his sophomore year in 2002-03 and then completing back-to-back undefeated seasons in 2003-04 and 2004-05 to claim Class AA titles at 140 as a junior and at 152 as a senior.

Sean ended his high school career with a 103-match win streak, and a final record of 179-15. He was also named the Dave Schultz Award recipient for Illinois.

He was also a three-time Junior Freestyle All-American, including a runner-up finish, and was third at the UWW Junior National Tournament. After high school, Sean went on to attend the University of Illinois under coach Mark Johnson, where, unfortunately, a series of injuries ended his college career before it began.

With his competition career over, he turned to coaching and assisted Mark Gardner, a 2013 IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee, at Bloomington High School where he coached multiple IHSA state placewinners and champions. Sean also helped found the Iguana Wrestling Club while coaching at BHS to help grow the Bloomington-Normal area's youth wrestling.

Sean then turned to the college ranks, coaching for a few years at Lincoln College, then helping as an assistant at Millikin University for three seasons before finally landing at Illinois Wesleyan University in 2024 as an assistant with their newly-reinstated Men's program and brand new Women's program.

He was just recently named the head coach of the Fightin' Titan RTC to help high school, college, and postcollege wrestlers further opportunities in national and international freestyle competition.

His brother Donald Jr., a 2022 IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee, was a two-time IHSA champion and four-time medalist at Providence Catholic who wrestled at the University of Illinois and then took four teams to state, including a second-place finisher in Class 3A in 2016, as head coach at Marmion Academy and he currently is the head coach at Providence Catholic. And his father, Donald Sr., has been a longtime successful coach with Team Illinois and also an assistant coach at Providence Catholic.

Sean has also coached the Team Illinois Freestyle National Team over the past 15 years making trips to Fargo and some of the Dual Team National Tournaments.

Eric Roberson, Roxana/SIU-Edwardsville/Alton Wrestler/Coach

Eric Roberson got his start in wrestling his fifth-grade year at the Roxana Park District and wrestled for coaches Glenn Exton, Don Milletello and Joe Huff in the Roxana kids club.

He wrestled for coach Larry Milazzo at Roxana High School and qualified for the IHSA state tournament three times, placing fourth in Class AA at 138 pounds in 1987, and accumulated 143 wins in his high school career. He was a four-time regional champion, a four-time conference champion and won a sectional title in his junior year at 126 pounds.

After high school, Eric earned a scholarship to wrestle at SIU-Edwardsville, an NCAA D-II national power at that time. He was a four-year starter at 142 pounds and qualified for the national tournament all four years of his career and won over 100 matches at SIUE. Eric was a two-time NCAA D-II All-American, placing fifth in 1991 and fourth in 1992, both times at 142 pounds. He was inducted in the SIUE Athletics Hall of Fame in 2018 as a member of the 1988 NCAA D-II National third-place team.

Eric caught the coaching bug when he was a student assistant coach at SIUE during the 1992-93 season. He then went on to coach at Roxana Junior High for one season, then moved to the assistant role at Roxana High School with his friend and mentor, Mike Kurth. Eric coached at Roxana from 1994-1996, where he helped Tom Riggins win an A title at 189 pounds in 1996.

Eric then left Roxana to restart the wrestling program at Alton High School. The program was dropped in 1982 but he started it back up from scratch in 1996 and has been coaching there ever since. At Alton, he has amassed 390 dual meet wins and has had 21 winning seasons there. Eric has had an individual state tournament qualifier 46 times with 10 of those earning All-State honors, including one state champion, Antonia Phillips, who won the title at 140 pounds in the inaugural IHSA Girls Wrestling State Tournament in 2022.

He has also been a two-time nominee for the IWCOA Class 3A Coach of the Year in 2017 and 2018. He has served on the IHSA Wrestling Advisory Board on two separate occasions, in 2015-17 and 2022-24. Eric is currently teaching Honors Anatomy and Physiology and Biology at Alton High School and serves as the Assistant Athletic Director.

Eric would like to thank all of the assistant coaches, present and past administration who have been a key part of his coaching career, and have been very supportive throughout the years. He would especially like to thank his family for providing an outstanding support system and providing him with all of the opportunities to pursue his passion. Eric would like to especially thank his wife Raelene, who has not only married him, but also chose to marry the sport of wrestling, and he appreciates everything she has done to allow him to coach the sport he loves. He will never forget all of the relationships that were formed with his past teammates, coaches and wrestlers.

2025 HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

Dion Wiley, Richton Park Official

Dion Wiley has participated in the sport of wrestling for over 42 years. He wrestled for one year before high school, then for four years at Bloom Trail High School in Chicago Heights for coach Ron Ray, a 1984 IWCOA Hall of Fame inductee. He also was on the wrestling team at Illinois State University for one season but was unable to compete due to injury. After college, he coached for 12 years as an assistant at Bloom Trail High School.

Dion has officiated in wrestling for 20 years. During that time, he was a two-time South Suburban Conference Wrestling Coaches Association Official of the Year and was nominated for three consecutive years for the IWCOA Official of the Year award.

He served four years on the IHSA advisory board as the wrestling representative. During his career, he's officiated 17 IESA regional tournaments, 15 IESA individual sectional tournaments, and six IESA individual State Tournaments. He's also officiated two IKWF Dual Team State Tournaments and two IKWF Individual State Tournaments.

Dion officiated the IWCOA Frosh/Soph Individual State Tournament for eight years and served as the Coordinator of Officials for three years. He was the first official to work the IESA, IKWF and IWCOA Frosh/Soph Individual State Tournaments.

He has officiated in 17 IHSA individual regional tournaments, 13 IHSA individual sectional tournaments, 11 IHSA Dual Team sectional tournaments, four IHSA Dual Team State Tournaments and six IHSA Individual State tournaments.

Dion has also had the privilege to officiate in 11 Al Dvorak Invitational Wrestling Tournaments, five Cheesehead Invitational Wrestling Tournaments in Kaukauna, Wisconsin and five Geneseo Invitational Wrestling Tournaments.

Some of his notable offseason tournaments include six Disney Dual tournaments in Orlando, Florida and six Middle School Dual tournaments in Des Moines, Iowa.

Dion earned Bachelor's and Master's degrees at ISU in 1992, 2013 and 2020 and is an Information Technology Director for Park Forest-Chicago Heights School District 163.

2025 IHSA State Tournament Grand Marshals – Mike Hurckes, Jerry Kelly, Billy Kelly, Dave Froehlich, and Joe Cliffe (Supervisor of Grand Marshals)

Six individuals who have reached the pinnacle of high school wrestling in Illinois, either as athletes, coaches, or supporters of the sport, will be honored by serving as Grand Marshals during the respective IHSA Boys & Girls Individual Wrestling State Finals in February and March of 2025.

Four Grand Marshals will lead the annual Grand March of finalists on Saturday, February 22 prior to the championship bouts of the 87th annual IHSA Individual Boys Wrestling State Final Tournament at the State Farm Center in Champaign-Urbana.

Two Grand Marshals will lead the procession of finalists in the Grand March of finalists on Saturday, March 1 prior to the championship bouts of the 4th annual IHSA Individual Girls Wrestling State Final Tournament at Grossinger Motors Arena in Bloomington-Normal.

The Grand March of finalists was first introduced at the boys state tournament in 1975, with the IHSA and Illinois Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association (IWCOA) working together to select the Grand Marshals who lead the parade. The tradition carried over into the girls state tourney when it debuted in 2022.

The Grand Marshals play an important role in the color and pageantry of the events, as they lead the individual

finalists and their coaches in a procession around the arena floor just prior to the championship bouts.

Here is a closer look at the Grand Marshals in 2025:

DAVE FROEHLICH



Coach Froehlich attended East Leyden High School, wrestling for Hall of Fame Coach

Chuck Farina. Dave placed third in the state his senior year in 1971 at 155 pounds. Four of the top five wrestlers at his weight that year went on to become Division 1 All-Americans, including a second, two fourths and an NCAA champion. That 1971 East Leyden team produced five wrestlers who later became head high school wrestling coaches in Illinois.

Attending Northwestern University after graduation, Dave was a four-year starter and eventual team captain for Hall of Fame Coach Ken Kraft. Dave placed second in the Big 10 his junior year and placed fourth in the NCAA in 1974. The next year Dave won the Big 10 title and finished in the top 8 at the National tournament. Graduating in 1975 with a degree in Education, Dave was selected for several awards at Northwestern, the most prestigious of which was the Big 10 Conference Medal of Honor, given to only one athlete at each Big 10 school annually.

Dave began teaching and coaching immediately after graduation at Rolling Meadows High School as an assistant to John Ellis. He assumed the Head Coaching job for the 1979-80 season and remained in that position for 36 more years before retiring in 2014. He finished his Head coaching career with 380 wins, 39 state qualifiers and 10 state place-winners.

Dave taught Health and Physical Education and served for 14 years as the school's Boys Athletic Director and coached Cross Country and Track for 18 years. Dave has two Masters' Degrees as well as certification as a personal trainer.

After retiring, Dave started coaching as an assistant to Shane Cook at Stevenson and still coaches there. He has also worked for 11 years as a substitute teacher. His hobbies include boating with his family and performing as an accordionist.

Dave and Sharon, his wife of 42 years, have two married sons, Steve (Brianne) and Mike (Sara) and a married daughter, Colleen (Patrick). They have been blessed with seven grandchildren, ranging in age from seven years old to six months old.

MIKE HURCKES



The youngest of seven boys, Mike was born and raised in McHenry, Illinois. Athletics

was an integral part of the Hurckes family. Attending games, matches, and practices was a way of life. Mike's love for the sport of wrestling began in high school. As a standout three-sport athlete, he was the first wrestling state qualifier to represent Johnsburg High School. A graduate of Monmouth College, Mike excelled in football during his four years and wrestled for two years.

In 1988, Mike renewed his passion for wrestling when he was hired as a teacher and head coach at Forman High School in Manito, Illinois, a position he held for three years. Mike was hired as the Head Wrestling Coach and assistant Football coach at McHenry High School in McHenry, IL. In four seasons as Head Coach of the McHenry Warriors, his teams dominated the Fox Valley Conference, winning 3 Conference championships, while losing only two Conference meets in that four-year span. Mike's 1994-1995 team finished undefeated 20-0 and ranked in the top ten. During his 7 years as Head Coach, Mike and his teams amassed a 113-30 record, along with producing 13 state qualifiers and 3 state champions.

Mike transitioned from coaching to officiating after the 1994-1995 season and is completing his 30th season as a state level wrestling official at the 2025 Dual Team State Tournament. Mike has officiated 15 IHSA State Finals, 9 IESA State Finals, and also serves as an IHSA Wrestling Rules Interpreter and Clinician. His knowledge, contributions and utilization of video technology plays an important role in educating and developing other officials. In 2021, Mike played an important role in the making of a NFHS educational officiating video.

In 2018, Mike was inducted into the Illinois Wrestling Coaches & Officials Association (IWCOA) Hall of Fame. Mike was honored as IESA Official of The Year in 2019, IHSA Official of The Year in 2020, received the (IWCOA) Lifetime Service Award in 2023 and was named (IWCOA) Official of The Year in 2024.

For the past three years Mike has served as a special consultant and assigner for the IESA. His primary role is to help with rules interpretations and questions along with assigning officials for the Regional, Sectional, and State Tournament.

Mike and his wife Nancy are both retired educators and reside in Ringwood, Illinois. They are the proud parents of four children and two grandchildren, Shelby, Austin, Chloe, Stori, Mirra and Myla.

BILLY KELLY



Billy Kelly is arguably the best wrestler in Richards High School history, where the Oak

Lawn native became a two-time IHSA state champion in 1980 and 1981 at 112 and 119 pounds, respectively. A four-time state place winner, he finished his high school career with a record of 138-4, including posting a perfect 75-0 record in duals en route to receiving All-American honors.

Kelly continued his wrestling career collegiately at Iowa State University, where he was a four-time NCAA National Tournament qualifier. His career culminated in 1987, when he won an NCAA National Championship while also helping the Cyclones win the national team title.

In Billy's final college match at the NCAA Finals, he faced Iowa's returning national champion. With Dan Gable's team on the verge of making history as the first to claim 10 straight team titles, Billy delivered a stunning upset, pinning his opponent with the infamous spladle. His victory not only denied Iowa its record-breaking title, but also secured the team championship for the Cyclones.

Kelly has been enshrined in the IWCOA, National Wrestling, and Glen Brand Wrestling Halls of Fame of Iowa Halls of Fame, while also receiving Iowa State's prestigious Walt Smith Ring for Most Outstanding Career. He collected 106 wins in his collegiate career, becoming one of 39 Iowa State records to break the century mark.

JERRY KELLY



Jerry Kelly set the stage for the family's famed wrestling lineage at Richards High

School in Oak Lawn, where he won a pair of IHSA Individual State Titles in 1977 and 1978 at 112 and 119 pounds respectively. During high school, he was also a five-time place winner and freestyle champion in the USA Junior National Tournament, while also placing sixth in the US Olympic Team Trials.

Jerry wrestled collegiately at Oklahoma State University, where he became a two-time All-American after placing second in 1980 and third in 1981.

After graduating, he set his sights on coaching, as he joined the coaching staff at Iowa State University, where he had the opportunity to coach his younger brother and fellow 2025 Grand Marshal, Billy.

Jerry returned to Illinois and joined the high school coaching ranks in the early 1990's, as he spent over a decade coaching at Monticello High School. He was named the Illinois Assistant Coach of the Year in 1996 by the IWCOA and was elected to the organization's Hall of Fame two years later.

Jerry went to serve as the head coach at MacMurray College in Jacksonville from 2003 to 2007, before starting a 17-year stint as the head coach of the Iron Sharpens Iron Wrestling Academy. He also served simultaneously as an assistant coach at Addison Trail High School for over a decade beginning in 2010.

Jerry's daughter, Mary Kelly, was a trailblazing female wrestler in the state and will serve as a Grand Marshal at the 2025 IHSA Girls Individual Wrestling State Finals on March 1.

MARY KELLY



Mary attended her first wrestling event in her first week of life, riding the bus along with the Iowa State wrestling team to Nebraska for a tournament that her Uncle Bill was competing in. She was born into a wrestling family with deep roots in Illinois. Her father and Uncle were from the south side of Chicago and earned induction into the Illinois Wrestling Coaches and Officials Hall of Fame for their respective careers. Mary followed them with her own Hall of Fame induction in 2019.

Mary began her wrestling career at the age of nine when her parents, Jerry and Beccie, decided to sign her brother Chris up for the local kid's club wrestling team. Mary followed suit and began competing on the all-boys Mahomet-Seymour kids club team until joining the Mahomet-Seymour Junior High team in 7th grade. Mary went undefeated until the State Tournament (31-1) in seventh grade. With the same undefeated scenario in 8th grade, she placed third in the IESA State Finals (36-1).

As a high school wrestler, Mary was a varsity starter from her sophomore through her senior year and was elected a team captain her senior year. She was the first female to win a match at the IHSA Dual Team State Tournament, where she helped lead the Bulldogs to third and fourth places finishes in 2001 and 2002, respectively. Mary won 75 varsity matches as a three-year starter. She was coached by IWCOA Hall of Fame Coaches, Rob Porter, Tom Porter, and Steve Combs. Combs had a huge influence on her summer freestyle wrestling.

While still in High School she became involved with women's wrestling competitions. She represented the USA competing in age group World Championships, winning silver in 1998 at Cadet Worlds and gold in 1999. She won silver in the 2000 Junior World Championships and a bronze in 2003. Mary also took home a bronze in the 2005 World University Games. All told, Mary was a Cadet World Champ and she would win five total world level medals.

After high school Mary attended multiple colleges pursuing her wrestling endeavors, including the U.S. Olympic Education Center at Northern Michigan University. She eventually moved on to become a resident athlete at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs. Mary placed fourth in the 2004 and 2008 Olympic Trials. She won the USA World Team Trails in 2006 and finished ninth at the Senior World Championships in Guangzhou, China. She competed on the 2007 World Cup Team, placing fifth. Mary was on the U.S. National team for seven years, representing the U.S. internationally in tournaments in 15 countries during her career.

After Mary's career came to an end due to injury, she continued on the road to recovery earning her degree in Community Health Education. She has turned her love of athletics and fitness into the health and wellness realm with Personal Training and CrossFit. Mary is now engaged to her fiancé Jeremy. Together they reside on the Big Island in Hawaii.

In 2025, the Mahomet-Seymour girls wrestling program began hosting the Mary Kelly Invitational.

FRED ARKIN



Fred was introduced to wrestling in 1970 as a freshman at Oak Park & River Forest

High School (OPRF) and eventually went on to compete collegiately at Washington University in St. Louis.

It was after college when Fred returned to the Oak Park area that he found his true calling in wrestling as a coach, administrator, and advocate for the sport. He organized and built the OPRF Little Huskies Wrestling Club and then did the same with Junior Cougar Wrestling Club at JB Conant High School.

Fred became very active in the IKWF and the Illinois Wrestling Federation (IWF). He coached and officiated Freestyle and Greco Roman programs, participating in state, regional, national and international events.

Fred went on to hold multiple leadership positions for IWF, providing much needed organization and vision. Under his leadership as the State Chairman, he oversaw IWF growth that saw its membership swell to the second largest in the nation. The IWF successfully hosted the 1994 Cadet World Championships and developed USA Wrestling's Junior National Dual Meet Championships. Under Fred's leadership, IWF also went on to found the Freshman/Sophomore State Tournament Series.

Fred's work with USAWrestling brought him to the 1995 World Championships and 1996 Olympic Games where he contributed as a volunteer staff member in the wrestling venue. For the past 15 years Fred has managed bench operations for the Midlands Wrestling Championships. He was inducted into the IWCOA Hall of Fame in 2010 for his contributions to the sport of wrestling.

In 2008, Fred returned to OPRF as a member of the of the coaching staff that won four IHSA 3A Dual Team Wrestling State Championships.

Then in 2017, Fred turned his attention to Girls Wrestling. He helped create the IWCOA Girls State Championships.

He went on to build a girls wrestling program at OPRF, where he hosted the first-ever high school girls wrestling tournament in Illinois, which consisted of 14 girls in three brackets. Together with leaders of the West Suburban Conference, Fred also went on to run the first girls conference wrestling tourney in state history.

As the Co-Chairman of the IWCOA's Steering Committee for Girls Wrestling, Fred used a grassroots approach to provide assistance to schools and coaches as they created opportunities for girls to participate on teams and in competitions.

Fred supported the IHSA by drafting the by-law to officially add Girls Wrestling as a sport. Fred's facilitation of growth and participation in Girls Wrestling for IHSA member schools lead to the establishment of and IHSA Girls State Tournament Series in 2022.

It is only fitting that the first girl to win a match at the inaugural IHSA Girls State Tournament in 2022 was coached by Fred.




